1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The College is one of the well-established colleges of the tehsil Shrigonda and in the village Pimpalgaon Pisa in Ahmednagar District of Maharashtra State. It belongs to Khandesh and Northern Maharashtra region. The area of Pimpalgaon Pisa is 3475 hectors. The total population of the village is more than eight thousand. Pimpalgaon Pisa is a place having history, from medieval to British period. The village is well known for cooperative sugar factory (K. S. S. K. Limited), Renukamata Temple, Visapur Jail, Visapur Dam, Beggar's Home etc. A big canal named 'Hanga Jalsetu' passes nearby and it is built with new technology and with great effort of architecture. Visapur is the nearest railway station.Kukadi Education Society was established in 1982 at Pimpalgoan Pisa. Before 1999, in this village no facility for higher education was available. To overcome this scarcity Kukadi Education Society decided to start a senior college at Pimpalgaon Pisa. The founder of the institution Late Shri. Kundalikrao Ramrao Jagtap Patil established this college. This college is a relatively small college functioning in rural area of Pimpalgaon Pisa, since June 1999. The college caters to the higher education requirements of the students in the vicinity through UG and PG programs like B.A. B.Com., B. Sc., M.A. Economics. The Arts faculty of the college is of Grant-in-aid in nature and permanently affiliated to SPPU, whereas Commerce and Science faculties are self -financed. The college has started its journey from utilizing the ZP's primary school building to well-equipped building in its own premises. Now the college is affiliated permanently to Savitribai Phule Pune University (formerly University of Pune) and recognized under 2(f) and 12 (b) by UGC. The growth of the college is quite perceptible as there is consistent improvement in number of programs, the student strength and its infrastructural facilities. This year, the college has enrolment of more than 500 students in all Streams. We hope that the Second Cycle accreditation will further strengthen the capacity of our institution to meet the future challenges. The Accreditation report is an important document that has been prepared with sincerity and honesty.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The College follows the curricula prescribed by Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune. The College offers total **8** programs including **7 UG**, **01 PG under** CBCS/Elective curriculum pattern. Three new programs namely **2 UG** program and **01 PG** program have been introduced during the assessment period. College faculty actively participated in framing the curriculum and in its effective delivery. Effective teaching methodolgies, systematized working through teachers diary, teaching plan and its completion report, orientation programs to make the stakeholders aware of the curriculum and its implementation are some of the examples of efforts taken by the college in curriculum delivery. Use of ICT teaching methods, e-content development and delivery, comprehensive evaluation techniques are an added effort by the teachers.

Maximum teachers participate in various examination related work like Question paper setting, Flying Squad, Assessment and Moderation work both in the college and in the parent university. The teachers work in various committees related to curriculum and preparing Academic calendar, Time Table, Allotment of workload, project work, teacher's diary. The IQAC conducts seminars/workshops, guest lectures, faculty orientation programs for curriculum enrichment and enhancement.

The college has introduced 6 certificate courses and around 50 percent of students opt for these courses. college integerates various cross cutting issues like professional ethics, gender sensitization, human values, awareness about environment sustainability is imparted to students by a blend of curriculum with co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Being in remote area, college realizes its role in creation of gender sensitization in the students through varied activities like self defense training, awareness regarding health and hygiene etc. The faculty takes care to motivate all the students to participate in all the activities conducted in the college .

Pratical training is provided to students through project work, field work and internship. for example participtation of students in environment proects, history etc.

The Institution has developed the structured feedback system is collected annually from students, teachers, Alumni and employers. The IQAC prepares the feedback form, analyses the feedback collected and then the Principal, management along with IQAC coordinator discusses the action to be taken and it is conveyed to faculty.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Being situated in the remote area, college combats the challenge and fills more than 75 percent of the seats. The number of students enrolled has increased every year. One of the features is increasing strength of the girls in the college. The total enrolment of the college is **548** in the current academic year 2021-22. The admission process is transparent and accessible and is done by an admission committee. college follows all the norms given by government in admission of reserved categories. Around 50 Percent of the students are from social diverse categories like SC, ST etc

The students are attracted to college due to correct blend of teaching methods like experiential learning,

participative learning and problem solving methodologies. Despite of rural area and the problems of network and electricity variation, the teachers have adopted ICT methodologies by developing e-content and used varied platform of virtual teaching.

The institution has filled more than 90percent of the sanctioned posts. Highly qualified and experienced staff is one of the highlights of the college. Total 16 teachers are working in the college, out of it **08** teachers have completed Ph.D. and **03** of them have registered for Ph.D, 9 teachers have qualified with NET/ SET and most of the teachers have completed their training. **03** Teachers have been recognized as research guides by Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune. Our college have **07** permanent non-teaching staff.

The half yearly assessment of the students is done through the term end/ Mid semester and university examination. There is a continuous assessment system as per the CBCS pattern. Evaluation process adopted by college includes Seminars, Projects, Oral Tests, Home Assignments, and Tutorials as per the University Guidelines. College has appointed college examination officer, has grievance redressal system wherein any grievances related to examination and other matters are solved in given stipulated time. Transparency is maintained in the examination system by involving all the stakeholders aptly.

IQAC trained the teachers in preparation of POs and COs. Teachers are following the system and are mapping the acheivement of outcomes. This has helped in increasing the passing percentage of students.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institute encourages and motivates its staff to pursue research activities. The **08** members have completed their Ph.D. and the others have registered for it. College has been successful in getthing research grants of approximately 6 lacs from external agency.

College has established an incubation cell in order to encourage research among students, help start ups by students and to motivate the faculties to apply for patents. In coming years the cell will be strengthened by attracting collaborations with industries and institutes.

The departments have organized 9 workshops on research methodology, IPR and entrepreneurship.

The members of the staff regularly present their papers in seminars, conferences and workshops. The articles are also published in National and International journals. To promote the research activities, the college has organized a workshops and seminars in the college. The institute has made available computer lab, internet and library facility for the research work. In the last five years, total 71 research papers/articles have been published by different faculties in UGC approved/referred Peer Reviewed Research Journals. **06** chapters in books and 06 full books were published by teachers. **03** teachers have been working as Ph.D. Guides affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune. Prof. N. D. Wajage have completed minor research project funded by UGC. The students of the college are included in research and extension activities. students are motivated to write papers/ projects on varied subject of interest.

The college has a full fledged NSS unit. The NSS unit undertakes the extension activities. NSS, Student Development Board, Women Development Cell Grievance Redressal committees have actively participated in extension activities under collaboration. The last camp of NSS was organized at **Nimbvi.** Camps like Swachh Bharat Mission, National Integration Camps, Blood Donation Camps, AIDS Awareness Campaign, Environment Awareness Program, International *Yoga* Day are organized.

More than **45** outreach programs have been carried out by the institute these includes tree plantation, campaigning for cleanliness, AIDS Awareness program, Blood Donation Camp and Women Empowerment. The college also made a good impression in sports.

The college has signed **11 MOUs** with other institutes to conducts activities for students and staff.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

College has developed adequate infrastructural facilities spread over an area of 2.32 acres with the total builtup area of the college being 30684.81 sq. mtr.

The campus is equipped with state-of-the-art infrastructural facilities with amenities and advanced equipment to strengthen TLP. The college owns 4 separate building 1). A Building, 2. B Building, 3.C Building 4.Canteen.

The A building has 07 classrooms, a computer laboratory, a well- furnished IQAC office and meeting hall. The Library (Knowledge Resource Center) has a built-up area of 42.4 sq.mtr, fully automated User Tracking System.

The building B has a seminar hall with good ICT facility, Commerce department and a 30 feet cultural open stage is built near this building.

The C building has 7 classrooms with the essential ICT facilities, 3 laboratories equipped with instruments, internet facility/Wi-Fi/LAN and a seminar Hall. The Principal's office is connected to a gallery for mementos/trophies. The administrative office consists of cubicles for various sections; accounts, scholarship, establishment, general register, and eligibility, inward and outward, and integrated with ICT.

The building D has college canteen with open lunch facilities.

The whole campus is protected by a compound and fencing and is under CCTV surveillance.

College has installed 4 rooftop solar panels, a rain water harvesting system and *a* botanical garden for students.

All the basic facilities like NSS room, girls common room, boys common room, mobile toilet facilities for both girls and boys are available. The college has installed 2 water purifiers and a cooler to cater to the students.

College has a playground of 9998.1sqmtr., an open gymkhana, a sports room, Open and closed parking etc.

The library is an integral part of the college and is spread over a spacious area of 42.87 sq.mtr. It is partially automated using LMS - E- Granthalaya. The user tracker system is also institutionalized in library since 2017, for daily usage. College website is used for open-access journals.

At present, the library is stocked with 4421 Books, 31 Journals, and periodicals. Library provides an access to 2000+ e-Journals and 35,00+ e-Books with the institutional membership of N-LIST-INFLIBNET.

Student Support and Progression

The Institution works for educationally and economically backward and rural students. Many of our students are from economically weaker strata of the society. The college provides financial assistance to these students which are received from central, state and other agencies. The institution has provided scholarship to students. More than 60 percent of the students have benefitted from both government and institutional scholarships.Earn and Learn Scheme is available for economically poor students.

College takes care to enhance the capacity of the students by imparting skills like life skills, language and communication skills, life skills and ICT computing skills to students.

College imparts career guidance and training to students on competitive examinations. Approximatly 22 percent of the students have benefitted by the activity. 11 students have passed in competitive examinations held.

The College has **Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti Ragging Committee and College Complaint (Anti-Sexual Harassment) committee** to resolve the issues of the students. The college provides suggestion boxes in the college campus.

The college has the Discipline Committee to monitor the activities of the students. The teachers regularly provide counselling to the students. College takes much care of students with physical disabilities. Humanitarian treatment is given to physical disabled candidates. **Gymkhana Committee, Cultural Committee, NSS, Student Development Board** motivate students to participate in various competitions and programs at various levels. The First Aid facility is made available in the college campus.

College has tried to place the students in industries and institutes in and around the places. In last 5 years, more than 44 percent of the students are either placed or are moving to higher education.

The students are also supported with the sport facility. 12 students have participated in sports and acheived awards. College has a huge ground and it is utilized to organize sports activities for students. The villagers are also involved in these activities.

The college have an Alumni registerd under 'Bombay Public Trust Act 1860'U/S -21 of the act. Through the association alumni are motivated to participate in college activities. The alumni participate in career guidance, academic support, provide spiritual lectures to villagers and have donated medicines.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college vision and mission are in tune with the goals and objectives. To achieve this vision and mission, the college practices **decentralized and participative management.** Parent institute looks in the matter of recruitment, augmentation of physical infrastructure and budget.

The Secretary of our institution, Rahul Kundalikrao Jagtap Patil is the Ex. Member of Assembly. The institution has ensured an efficient internal coordinating and monitoring system for effective implementation and improvement. The college promote a culture of participative management.

The institution has College Development Committee (CDC) which plays a vital role in planning and decisionmaking process. For smooth functioning of the college and for effective decentralization, college has given controlled autonomy to the departments.

Principal forms various statutory committees and workgroups for effective implementation and execution of curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities in the college. 25 administrative committees and 15 committees for Co-curricular & extra - curricular activities help in deployment of perspective plan.

The perspective plan is prepared and implemented under the guidance of the Principal and the Management. The Management always encourage and motivates the members of the staff for their involvement in the improvement and development of the institution. The appointment rules are framed and teachers are appointed as and when required.

Institute implements e-governance in administration, in accounts, students admission and in examination. Software and ERP is used.

An effective performance appraisal system is followed for the appraisal of teaching and non teaching staff. An effective welfare policy for the college is carved by providing loan facility, leaves and an opportunity for career advancement. Due to adequate care more than 50 percent of the staff has undertaken faculty development or training programs.

Institution has an apt strategy for mobilisation and utilization of resources through affiliating university, from government, management and internal resources. The audit of these resources are conducted annually by an appointed Auditor by the institution.

The IQAC is functional and positively contribute to the quality-based policy statements. It takes major policy decisions, reviews feedback mechanism, monitors performance appriasal system, enhances quality audits like green audit, AAA and is responsible for all the incremental improvement

Institutional Values and Best Practices

College always focuses on the gender equity promotion and sensitivity by organizing various programs like Women Empowerment counselling sessions, guest lectures, HB check-up camp. College provides essential physical facilities like Girls common room etc. Special activities are conducted for girls to promote gender sensitization. The outcome of all this is reflected on the increased number of girls in the college.

In order to sensitize students and teachers, national integration activities like Pledge on Constitution Day, Voter awareness program, poster presentation, AIDS Awareness program were organized.

Cultural festivals, linguistic celebrations, communal harmony activities help in developing harmony among students.

The college Carries Green Audit, Energy Audit and Environment Audit for improved infrastructural and environmental facilities.

The college has provided ramp for differently abled students. The faculty is always ready to provide necessary help to differently abled students.

The college focuses on adopting best practices such as motivating students and teachers for research and green initiatives for environmental friendliness.

The two best practices are:

1. Fort Conservation and Preservation

Maharshtra is well known for its forts and the Maratha struggle for protection of forts from foreign aggression. Keeping in line with these historical aspects, college started developing an awareness regarding forts and involved students into it by organizing activities related to fort protection and conservation. College has selected "**Bahadurgad**" wherein students undertook cleaning, Tree Plantation, and maintenance of fort. The success of the activity is reflected in increase in fort visitors, growth of trees etc.

2. Taekwondo Training Camp

Students especially girls are provided training in Taekwondo. The Taekwondo camp typically runs for 15 days from 1st January to 15th January every year and includes intensive training sessions and developing physical fitness, mental strength and Taekwondo skills.

The distinct feature is scholarship scheme and participation and impact of institute on the village due to its activities.

In last five year more than 60 percent have benefitted from the scholarship scheme.

One more distinct feature of the college is that it is working for the benefit of the residentials in and around the college complex through blood donation camps, working as covid centre

3. Skill development:	Savitribai Phule Pune University started programs of skill and knowledge development which is implemented in the curriculum Framework for the undergraduate classes. It will prove a driving force behind the financial growth and social development of India. This is also one of the objectives of any people fostering quality education in order to make students better citizens. The skills and knowledge enhance through various subjects, courses and activities. The core and elective courses and its implementation in the curriculum help to develop their skills and knowledge and prove fruitful to get the best opportunity in various sectors. Our Institution through different subjects is providing value-based education to inculcate positivity amongst the students that include the development of humanistic, ethical, constitutional and universal values of truth, righteous conduct, peace, love, non- violence, scientific-temper, citizenship values and also live skills through the programs of Science and Humanities. Our institution takes efforts to arrange workshops, Yoga activity, hypnotism, social activities through NSS, certificate courses, seminars and arranged special lectures on life-skills through online and offline mode. The students have a large amount of flexibility in closing individual curriculum and a certain subject.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Faculty members of the institution use mother tongue to describe the topic in lecture to make the student more understandable and comfortable. Various subjects like English, Marathi, History, Politics provide wide range of information of Indian history and knowledge. The institutional faculties are using bilingual mode for teaching. As our Institute located at ruler area, most of the students are from farming background. Our institution preserves and promotes

6. Distance education/online education:	As NEP 2020 focuses on distance education/online education which covers a large quantity of students from distant mode who is employed in other places. The institution has decided to provide such facilities for imparting online education. At Pandemic time of Covid-19 situation our faculties are trained to work on online mode. Teachers are suggested and some of those already have obtained technical skills and advanced current knowledge of online teaching and its trends. Teachers in our Institution are suggested to use Google classroom, The ICT based facilities are

	created for imparting online education. The conversational chalk and talk method of lecturing is adopted in classroom along with the use of projects for slide shows. Some infrastructural facilities and the expertise of the teacher are still to be improved and in future to prepare for distance or online education.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

Our institution is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune and adheres to the curriculum prescribed by the University. The Syllabi of programs and courses are planned by the Board of studies of affiliating university. Teaching faculty participate in Syllabus framing workshops organized by other institutions. Some faculties have participated in syllabus framing committee of Savitribai Phule Pune University. Bridge course in English, Basic of Accounting and Physics is conducted for newly admitted students. Add-on, Certificate /Value Added courses are conducted by the college.

Curriculum Planning: Academic Planning is done at three levels:

- 1. Institutional Level
- 2. Departmental Level
- 3. Faculty Level

IQAC prepares the institutional academic calendar prior to commencement of every academic year in tune with university academic calendar. The academic calendar specifies suitable dates for conducting curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities along with continuous internal Assessment. The academic calendar is uploaded on the institutional website and displayed on notice board for stakeholders.

Concerned departments prepare their departmental academic calendars accordingly. Courses are distributed as per the workload in the first meeting of department.

Curriculum Delivery

On the basis of the workload teachers plan the teaching methods and activities to be carried out during the entire academic session. Teachers prepare course wise teaching plans before the commencement of classes. Teaching diary is maintained by teachers which includes course wise teaching plan, record of lectures, practical and curricular, co-curricular activities. The execution of teaching plan is noted in completion report at the end of the academic year.

The time table committee prepares program wise time table for theory and practical. Each department then prepares departmental time table and it is displayed on college notice board. IQAC takes review of syllabus completion at the end of each term/semester and reports to the Principal.

For effective curriculum delivery, teachers use ICT tools like PPT, Google classroom, Zoom platform, YouTube videos. During COVID- 19 faculty made effective and efficient use of various online social

platforms and E-Learning Resources. During this period, students from remote and distinct places had difficulty of access to network. Faculty overcame this difficulty by preparing a vast database of E-Content and providing them online. Students could access this database at their convenience.

Continuous Internal Assessment:

The college examination department prepares exam academic calendar every year for Continuous Internal Assessment. The institute conducts practical and internal examination as per the exam academic calendar and time table. Notices and timetable of internal examinations are displayed on student notice board and also circulated class wise on WhatsApp groups. Study material, e-content and question banks are provided to the students. The record of internal examinations is maintained by the all departments. Varied methods like assignments, tutorials, projects, presentations etc are used. ICT tools are used for conducting CIE.

IQAC keeps a constant follow-up of implementation of syllabus, curricular and co-curricular activities and continuous internal evaluation. Institute obtains feedback on curriculum by the stakeholders and takes necessary action for further improvement. Feedback mechanism from students, parents, alumni, helps us to revise teaching methods, teachers performance.

1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

Our college follows the curriculum prescribed by Savitribai Phule Pune University which incorporates the various cross cutting issues. The college takes many initiatives to make the student sensitive, responsive and accountable to value different perspective of life through the syllabus of Certificate Courses designed by our college and organizes Seminars, Workshops and Co-curricular activities which integrates these cross-cutting issues.

Professional Ethics

This is reflected in the curriculum of B.A. languages which includes topics like communication skills, interview skills, presentation skills and creative writing.

B.A. and M.A program: includes market structure and psychological counselling.

In the B.Com. Curriculum topics like Business Communication, Business Law and Etiquettes, Soft Skills, Insurance and Marketing, Digital Marketing, English for Competitive Examination, Personality Development and Computerized Account Writing develop adequate professional ethics among the students. Field-Visit and industry visits give them first-hand experience of professional ethics.

B.Sc. includes safety in chemical laboratory experimentation. Ethical practices such as Integrity, Honesty and unbiased approach to community are included in the syllabus of Certificate Courses designed by the institution.

Gender

The college offers co-education and takes various measures for gender sensitization. The texts of B.A. contains topics related to gender sensitization and teach gender equality directly or indirectly.

Women empowerment cell and N.S.S. sensitize the students on gender equality issues viz., Women's rights, Domestic violence, Health and hygiene, Self-defence, Save Girl child campaign, Personality Development Programme, celebration of International Women's Day, Essay and Poster Competition, Wall Paper Presentations, Rallies etc. N.S.S. volunteers perform street plays for Gender Sensitization, Gender Discrimination and Inequality, Subordinate Treatment and Family Problem, Exploitation, Socio-economic Status and Male Dominating Society. Taekwondo training conducted for girl's safety in college for women empowerment.

Human Values

Human values are reflected in the curriculum of B.A languages. Political Science includes issues related to Human values like: Civic issues; Economics reflects issues of Poverty and Unemployment. The college offers credit-based courses on Human Rights, Cyber Security and Introduction to democracy and governance, physical education. The study of the Indian Constitution through disciplines like Political Science and History sensitizes students about gender equality and human rights.

To inculcate human values and national integration among students, the institution celebrates Gandhi Jayanti, Constitution day; Voter's Day and organizes rallies on *Har Ghar Tiranga*, Run for Unity, Fit India, Independence Day and Republic Day.

N.S.S. department organizes Blood Donation Camp, AIDS Awareness Programme, Covid-19 Activities and sensitizes students to human values.

The Environment and Sustainability

The subjects like Environmental Studies, Geography, and Economics- sensitizes students to environmental issues and make them aware of soil conservation, water conservation, pollution, the impact of deforestation and global warming.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

College adapts several teaching-learning practices for the overall development of the students. Teachinglearning approaches are mainly based on accomplishments of teachers and students together in the class as well as outside of the class. The college runs several programs at UG level and single course at PG level. Various departments put on different types of educational tactics, procedures and events, such as seminars, survey methods, lecture methods, special guest lectures, Group discussions, lab activities and experimental methods, Project Method, Poster Exhibitions, Excursions, Trip and Debate Competition as follow.

1. Experiential Learning:

- The teachers-students interaction while communicating any lesson in the class.
- The everyday live examples are given while teaching in the classroom.
- Science faculty students directly involve with the experiment of each subject in the practical sessions in laboratories.
- The department of English uses communicative teaching methods while teaching the topic on communication skills and others.
- The department of Commerce organized a session to assigns the job responsibilities to students and communicates them the responsibilities of Bank Manager, Cashier and Accountant.

2. Participative Learning

- The involvement of all students and teachers in organizing Seminars, Research Project Work, Survey Work, Industrial Visit, Poster Presentation, Excursions, Exhibitions.
- The participation of students in competitions organized by departments or in intercollegiate competitions.
- The students' active participation in 'AVISHKAR' (research) competition.

3. Problem –Solving method

- College tries to develop the critical thinking, decision making ability, reasoning power of the students with adapted teaching methods for versatile development of the students that make them active in the classroom.
- To make students aware of any issues the teachers ask short questions while teaching for the learners' better understanding and comprehension.
- The home assignments, discussion on the format of question papers and suggestion of some reference books help student to solve their doubts.
- Asking questions and the doubts of the students in the classroom makes teacher update and puzzling questions and the problem solving methods make students ready for their overall development.
- Organization of study tours, the brain storming sessions and guest lectures help student for better understanding any topics or points.

4. Using ICT tools

- College teachers use Projectors, PC's, Laptops and Videos in daily teaching.
- PPT's on the related topics are presented in the classroom.
- Mathematics and science teachers use computers for the practicals.
- The Central Library of the college is digital. The teachers and students can use the required resources online whenever and wherever it is required.
- In the pandemic period of COVID19 our college teachers adapted themselves with ONLINE teaching (ICT enabled) mode on ZOOM, Google Classroom, YouTube Chanel and GOOGLE MEET platform throughout the academic year.
- The teachers of the college used Google Docs to create Online Quiz to conduct the college examination and other related activities.

Due to use of these varied methods and a right blend of these methods, students are benefitting in their holistic development. Though the college belongs to a rural area but still college is contributing to increase in progression of students to higher education and placements.

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Internal and External assessment is transparent

Evaluation is an important tool to assess the domain knowledge of the students and understanding of the subject. The college adopted internal/external evaluation system by adhering with the affiliating University examination schedule, unit tests and term or semester end examinations. Internal examination is an integral part in the education system. The university has framed guidelines to conduct examination in fair and transparent manner. The institute has been following the guidelines strictly.

Semester pattern has been introduced which comprises 70:30, pattern. The 70 mark examinations are conducted by the university at the end of each semester. The remaining 30 marks evaluation is entrusted with the institute. The institue focuses on the comprehensive internal evaluation (CIE) system. Varied methods of assessments are followed like tutorial, Home Assignment, Internal exams, Oral test, Seminars, Presentation, etc.

The college maintains transparency by giving tiemly information about the examinations to all its stakeholders. At the beginning of Academic year, academic calendar is prepared by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) thus, students know about the dates of examination, laboratory practical, seminars, project through the notices, university circulars class tests (CT), submission of assignments well in advance.

The internal examination results are communicated to the students in the class as well as by the notices on

the board.

The Examination officer runs systematic process to ensure smooth conduct of university examinations. Proper Notices regarding the examination are displayed on notice boards and WhatsApp groups of the classes.

The college has established a college examination committee with the head as the Chief Examination officer (CEO). The committee takes care to maintain the transparency and also paves way to solve the grievances of the students.

The college has a time bound and effecient grievance redressal system.

The college has established a Grievance Redressal Committee that looks after examination grievances and the redresses the same as one of its functions

Most of the querries by students are regarding discrepancy in the evaluation , about the assessment, or regarding the change in name/ surname, subject etc. The college and the committee coordinates with the affiliating university and solves these querries in the minimum stipulated time. For the assessment related querries, there is system of revaluation or re-checking. The students has the facility of taking xerox answer sheets too. These facilities are provided to the students.

Appointments with appropriate instructions of senior and junior supervisors are made to conduct examinations in a disciplined manner. Semester end and university examinations were held online by the university due to Covid-19. Students were instructed to contact the authority of the Examination for help.

Since last few years, the affiliating university has asked the colleges to conduct all the first year examination and second year (since 2022) at college level. College has established a Central Assessment Program Unit (CAP) at college level. All the facilities available at university level are provided at college level too. The CAP director is responsible for the timely communication of the result to the students.

The college is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University and hence followed its curriculum. The

affiliating university displays the curriculums of all the programmes, as well as all the outcomes of the programmes, on its website. The college follows these guidelines while framing its program outcomes and course outcomes.

IQAC coordinator explains the techniques of framing the outcomes. If program outcomes are specified by the university, the same outcomes are followed. But if the outcomes are not stated, then the head of the departments state the outcomes for respective programs. The subject teacher, states course outcome on the basis of the program outcomes. While framing the program outcomes, the vision and mission of the college are followed. The final aim is to give an opportunity to the learner for the holistic development of their personality.

The affiliating university is following choice based credit system and accordingly, there was change in the curriculum, subjects etc. The head of the departments and the staff framed the course outcome accordingly. As new courses are introduced, the course outcomes are reframed by the staff and the same is displayed on the college website. The outcomes stated are discussed with the principal and the IQAC coordinator. If there are any suggestions, the same are incorporated and the course outcomes and program outcomes are finalized.

The Programme outcomes stresses on the following values.

- They will be capable of being responsible citizens.
- Their actions will reflect on values such as social and professional ethics.
- They will be well versed in environmental and sustainable development issues.

B.Sc.

• The students will solve problems by applying physics laws in real-life situations.

- The students will develop a mathematical mind-set.
- The students will acquire knowledge of chemicals, principles and their effective application.

The stakeholders mainly students and teachers are made aware about the program outcomes and course outcomes as they are placed on the college website. The website display the outcomes in of every course. Career Counseling and Guidance Cell organizes career orientation lectures and provide the information about the program and course outcomes to the students. The departments discusses the outcomes during the induction meeting which are held in the first fortnight of July or First week of August every year. The teachers also communicate the outcomes to the students during the classroom interaction regularly.

2.6.2 Attainment of POs and COs are evaluated. Explain with evidence in a maximum of 500 words

Response:

The college offers B.A at UG and PG level ., B.Sc. and B.Com programs (UG). The attainment of the outcomes is a conitnous activity in the college. Considering the programme results, the college evaluates the phases of teaching-learning progression and assessment methods. The programme outcomes and course outcomes are studied through the events in which students contribute. The attainment of POs and COs are evaluated throughout the year with the help of some predetermined apporaches.

The two way approach used to monitor the attainment are:

1. Direct Approach: Attainment of Programme Outcomes is evaluated through Teaching and completion of syllabus, Evaluation and assessment of papers, Internal examinations that are of generally 30 marks, students performance in external examinations that are of 70 marks, Practical's for subjects like sciences, commerce, psychology, Assignments are given for each subject per term, Projects on research topics and related topics are given and students get an opportunity to present them in the class. The other activities that are used to map the attainments are class activities and seminars.

Attainment of Course Outcomes is evaluated through: Students' Performance in all or few of these components.

2. Indirect Approach: Attainment of Programme Outcomes is evaluated through Co-curricular activities, Extra- curricular activities, various competitions Exhibitions.

Programme Outcomes is evaluated through personal interaction with students, increasing strength of students opting for higher studies like post- graduation. Women empowerment by cultivating skills such as

gaining confidence, leadership, and management and professional qualities required for employment.

The course and programme outcomes are evaluated by the students' participation in a various programmes throughout the year, such as exhibitions, cultural day, competitions and farewell functions. In addition, these students participate in College-organized programmes on behalf of their departments. The students of the departments also participate in communal service. Through their participation in programmes students demonstrate their discernment, social skills, communication skills, creative skills, leadership skills, teamwork spirit, readiness to take responsibility, accountability. The overall performance of the students in academic and non-academic programmes is used to measure program outcomes. Teachers offer feedback to students based on their presentation. Thus, the students are benefitted by the achievement of programme outcomes and course outcomes. The attainment of COs is evaluated directly in terms of performance of the students in the university examinations. The respective departments evaluate the overall attainment level of the entire COs for each course using a pre-defined procedure.

One of the examples of evaluation of course outcome attainment is stated as under:

The Mapping is 1. 70%-100% = distinction

2. 60%-70%- Firstclass

3. 50%-60%- second class

4 More than 40% - pass

In the year 2021: the subject of hisotry of the Modern World in 20th Century had 42 students. Out of these, 12 students passed in distinction, 7 in firstclass and 3 in Higher second class. Out of 42, 11 students couldnt successfully pass the examination. So the course attainment of that course was 52.38

In the same year, the program outcome of the students was 80.76 percent through direct assessment.

Response:

The institute, Kukadi Education Society's Pimpalgaon Pisa is situated in the rural area of Ahmadnagar District but the governing council of HEI believe that the use of modern technology and infrastructural facilities are important tools for the quality improvement of stakeholders. Accordingly, college has developed adequate infrastructural facilities spread over an area of 2.32 acres with the total built-up area of the college being 30684.81 sq. mtr.The College ensures the up gradation and optimal use of the infrastructural and ICT facilities.

Physical facilities

The campus is equipped with state-of-the-art infrastructural facilities with amenities and advanced equipment to strengthen TLP. The college owns 4 separate building 1). A Building, 2. B Building, 3.C Building 4.Canteen.

The A building has 07 classrooms, a computer laboratory with the essential ICT facilities for effective curriculum delivery, a well- furnished IQAC office and meeting hall. The Library (Knowledge Resource Center) has a built-up area of 42.4 sq.mtr. along with the periodicals section and a common reading hall on ground floor. It has fully automated User Tracking System. Career Guidance Cell is also located on the campus.

The building B has a seminar hall with good ICT facility, Commerce department and a 30 feet cultural open stage is built near this building.

The C building has 7 classrooms with the essential ICT facilities for effective curriculum delivery and 3 laboratories equipped with instruments, internet facility/Wi-Fi/LAN. A big Seminar Hall is located on the second floor with ICT facilities. The building has been designed and constructed for efficiency and ease of administration. The Principal's office is connected to a gallery for mementos/trophies. The administrative office consists of cubicles for various sections; accounts, scholarship, establishment, general register, and eligibility, inward and outward, and integrated with ICT.

The building D has college canteen with open lunch facilities.

The whole campus is protected by a compound and fencing and is under CCTV surveillance.

To conserve energy college has installed 4 rooftop solar panels and also a rain water harvesting system.

A botanical garden for students has been made.

All the basic facilities like NSS room, girls common room, boys common room, mobile toilet facilities for both girls and boys are available. The college has installed 2 water purifiers and a cooler to cater to the students.

Cultural and sports activities

An open gymkhana is the highlight of the college infrastructure, a sports room, a huge play ground used for all the outdoor games, Open and closed parking facility for both students and staff. The playground has an area of 9998.1sqmtr. The ground is used for all the outdoor activities and is even used for social extension activities. Its even used by the villagers to conduct certain common programs in the village.

Yoga Centre

The centre stage situated in between all the four buildings surrounded by greenery and an open ground is used by the teachers and students for yoga and meditation. The days like International Yoga Day, self-defense workshops for girls are conducted on the open ground.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

The library is an integral part of the college and provides adequate knowledge resources and services to the stakeholders. It was established since inception with books and today is spread over a spacious area of 42.87 sq.mtr. It is partially automated using LMS - E- Granthalaya. The automation is used for accession, issue return and for preparation of catalogues. Being located in rural area and being subjected to constant variation in electricity supply, the librarian also prepares issues book manually through borrowers card.

Library committee is constituted for the efficient functioning of the library and it comprises of the Principal as Chairman, the Librarian as Member Secretary and one senior faculty and a student representative as member. The committee meets once in each year to plan the budget, purchase of books and references, review budget utilization and related administrative matters for smooth and effective functioning.

At present, the library is stocked with 4421 Books, 31 Journals, and periodicals. Library provides an access to 2000+ e-Journals and 35,00+ e-Books with the institutional membership of N-LIST-INFLIBNET.

The college uses a software named D-Space wherein the e-contents like presentations, pdfs etc are made available to the students 24X7.

Borrowing and issuing of books is done by using USER TRACKING SYSTEM software with Barcode technology and the OPAC facility is used for easy searching of books. Students can borrow 02 books at a time for 7 days and can be renewed for the next 7 days. Additional books are issued as per the procedure. The student's ID cards are issued with a barcode .

One of the distinct feature of the library is availability of the library resources to the students as and when they require. There are no limitations regarding the days and timing of the issue and return of the books.

The user tracker system is also institutionalized in library since 2017, for daily usage. College website is used for open-access journals. For efficient functioning, Library is divided into unique sections: Acquisition/Processing, Circulation, Reference, Periodicals.

Library services are reviewed and upgraded periodically. The stock verification of library assets is carried out after one year as per the procedures. The efforts made during the last five years resulted in an increase of 2501 books and 16 periodicals with an expenditure amount of 514929 lakhs.

Per day usage for last 5 years is 58 although college was functioning online during COVID 19 pandemic.

The college provides the facility of open access to the students and staff.

The library timing for the usage is generally from 9.00am to 4.00pm.

The college retains the thesis of the teachers with highest degrees and the same can be used by other teachers and students as reference.

Good dessertations of the faculty and students, projects of post graduate students are displayed in the library and are used by the students.

The college has a reading hall with a seating capacity of approximately 50 students. Students are motivated by the staff to use the reading hall regularly.

Response:

Though situated in remote rural area but college has focussed on the development and maintainence of its IT facilities. Hence, college is considered as one of the developed colleges in and around the area.

Savitribai College of Arts has good IT facilities available for teaching- learning, research, and administration. College continuously reviewed and upgraded the facilities including software, hardware's, internet/Wi-Fi connectivity, backup, and allied IT facilities to ensure better learning experiences in line with the vision-mission statement.

IQAC has framed the policies and procedures for the establishment, and up gradation of IT facilities in tune with the perspective plan. The plan includes increasing the number of computers with latest versions, providing laptops for completing daily activities, provision of softwares to the faculties. The college has procured required number of printers, scanners, Xerox machines, digital cameras, Audio-Aids, internet, etc., and are purchased according to procedures. In order to assist the teachers in use of ICT methodologies, the college has LCD projectors and interactive boards. These facilities helped the teachers to deliver the lectures effectively during the lockdown of the educational institutions during covid pandemic.

College has upgraded the internet connectivity from 05 to 100 Mbps bundled connectivity under the VPN broadband facility from Rail Co-operation and other service providers. All the computers are connected with Wi-Fi/LAN. All the academic departments and administrative sections are equipped IT facilities for stakeholders. College has Biometric access control for the teaching and non-teaching staff. College has one dedicated server for the smooth functioning of the office, library, and exam department.

All the college administrative departments follow e-governance. The college office maintains soft copy of the record of its students. The admission of the students is online where in students take admission through online mode. For admissions college uses Vriddhi software. The fee receipts are also given virtually.

The examination department uses Vriddhi software for preparation of students record like list, issue of hall tickets and subjectwise summary of students. The papers are received through online mode and then the hard copies are printed in the college examination office.

The college library is fully automated with LMS software. It has a subscription of e-books and e- journals via e-shodhsindhu etc. This provides facility of remote access to students and staff.

College has an ERP for regular assistance to teachingstaff, administrative staff, library etc. Students attendance is monitored through it.

The college has one computer lab for UG, PG students.

These efforts are reflected in terms of strengthened TLP that has been evidenced from the COVID19 pandemic. During lockdown, education system took a paradigm shift from offline to online, college reviewed the IT facilities, upgraded as per the need of time, and not only adopted an online education system but also made it learner friendly. All educational activities including teaching- learning and evaluation were carried out online using various software's and platforms like Google classroom, Zoom, Flipped classroom and google quiz using ICT enabled classrooms and IT laboratories. HEI subscribes timely antivirus packages (NPAV) for data security.

The subsequent governing body too has continued functioning with the same motto by incorporating all the modern management principles. The college vision and mission is attuned to the goals of establishment.

To achieve this vision and mission, the college practices **decentralized and participative management.** Parent institute looks in the matter of recruitment, augmentation of physical infrastructure and budget.

The College Development Committee (CDC) that comprises of management representatives, Principal, senior faculty, non teaching staff, student representative and external members (Industrialist) -prepares a perspective plan along with an action plan. It deliberates on the issues like annual budget, expenditure, augmentation of physical and academic facilities, results of examination and day-to-day functioning of the college. The finance and its audit is managed by CDC.

For smooth functioning of the college and for effective decentralization, college has given controlled autonomy to the departments. The Head of the department prepares the departmental time table, assign workload to the faculty and takes decisions regarding activities at departmental level.

Principal forms various statutory committees and workgroups for effective implementation and execution of curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities in the college. A functional IQAC works on the action plan and it is put for final approval in CDC. The management, Principal and the faculties work in conjunction to execute its plans. The college development committee, Principal, IQAC, heads of

departments, administrative staff and the student council hold regular meetings to decide the plan of action and its proper implementation.

College takes all the cognizance to include all the members of teaching and non teaching staff in its regular working. All meetings are communicated by issuing a notice along with a detailed agenda. Kukadi Education Society's Savitribai College of Arts is permanently affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University. At Institution level college is governed by the President and the Secretary. The Principal is the head of the internal administration and is assisted by the Clerks, HoD's, Staff, and IQAC. The apex body of the college is College Development Committee (CDC).

The Institutional Strategic / Perspective Plan is effectively deployed:

The Perspective Plan document is an important document for development and deployment process. College has prepared Perspective/Strategic Plan period. Institution has implemented strategic plan successfully for promotion of research and extension activities.

Measures have been taken to inculcate Quality Policy as below:

- 1. To promote research culture.
- 2. To organize National / International seminars, conferences on research and quality themes.
- 3. To establish functional MoU's, collaborations.
- 4. Social and Extension Activities

Administrative Setup:

- 1. The administrative setup consists of the Principal followed by the faculty in charges, Head and Senior Clerks and Peons.
- 2. The departments include Heads, Associate Professors, Assistant Professors, Librarian and Education and Sports includes Director of Physical Education.

Procedures for Appointment:

The appointment in college is carried out in two different ways:

- **Permanent Posts (Grant-in-aid):** These posts are recruited by the Parent institution following the rules and norms of the University, Government of Maharashtra and UGC.
- **Temporary Posts (Non-Grant):** These posts are recruited by the Institution Management according to the norms of the University and UGC. & Maharashtra Government. (UGC 18th July 2018, 8th March & 10th May 2019 Government of Maharashtra.)

Service Rules:

For the service conditions and rules, the college adheres to all the rules and regulation laid down by S. P. Pune University, Pune, UGC, New Delhi and Government of Maharashtra.

Procedures for Promotion:

UGC Amendment is implemented in accordance with the rules of 18th July 2018 and 18th March 2019. The Government of Maharashtra adopted the UGC Rules. The CAS process for the internal promotion of staff is followed. For example the internal promotions of associate professors, professors is carried out in the college through Savitribai Phule Pune University as per the rules of the Government of Maharashtra and University Grants Commission, New Delhi. Due to these prominent facilities provided college has 4 Associate professors and 12 assistant professors.

Research climate development for Faculty:

- 1. Research and Development committee of the college encourages faculty to complete M. Phil's and Ph.D's.
- 2. Principal, Research Committee Members and Management encourage teachers to organize and to participate national/international conferences.
- 3. Principal and IQAC motivate faculty to attend online and offline FDP, Refresher and Orientation Courses.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and

Response:

Performance appraisal for teachers:

The college follows the 'performance based assessment system' prescribed by UGC in its regulations of June 2009. College follows API system developed by UGC, New Delhi. All faculty members fill up the PBAS form for annual self-assessment. API verification is done by IQAC committee. Coordinator of IQAC evaluates the form and submits it to the principal for final approval. The principal forward the eligible cases of the teaching staff to University and Joint director of Higher Education, Government of Maharashtra for Career Advancement Scheme.

Performance appraisal of non-teaching staff:

The performance appraisal of non-teaching staff is done through the confidential report. The non-teaching staffs are given promotions on the basis of the confidential reports prepared by the principal. The government rules as well as the norms of Management of parent institution are mandatory for the non-teaching staffs. The promotion will be given as per the consideration of requirement of the posts and the preference will be given as seniority wise.

Welfare measures

The college ensures the professional development of both teaching and non-teaching staff through various welfare measures. Our college staff has membership of Ahmednagar District Secondary Teachers Co-Operative Credit Society LTD who provides financial assistance in the form of *Jamin* Loans, Emergency fund, Welfare Loans, Educational loans and other facilities like *Purogami Kanyadan Bhagylakmi Yojna*, Deceased Members Debt Relief Fund, educational loan at low interest to the wards of the employees.

- Jamin Loan: The Co-operative Credit Society offers Jamin loan of up to Rs.18 lakh to all registered members.
- Emergency Loan: An immediate loan up to Rs. 50,000 to all members is given to each person
- Welfare Lone : Welfare loan limit is up to Rs. 15000.
- Educational Loan: Each member is given a loan up to Rs. 2.5 lakhs as education loan for children's education of registered members.
- **Public accident insurance:** All the members of the association have public accident insurance of rupees one lakh.

For a comfortable stay, college provides different types of leaves:

- **Duty Leave:** is allowed to the teaching and non-teaching staff to participate in Seminars, Conferences, and Workshops arranged by other colleges in and around the country.
- **Medical Leave:** is issued by the UGC and the Government of Maharashtra and is applicable to all employees of the college. The college staff has used medical leave during their sickness.
- Employee Provident Fund Scheme: The old pension scheme is applicable to the employees appointed before 2005 as per the rules and regulations of UGC and Government of Maharashtra. National Pension Scheme (NPS) facility has been extended to employees whose appointment has been made after November 2005 as per the government decision.

College takes care of physical fitness of the staff and students. An open GYM, an internal gym, a large playground is available for the teachers and students for 24X7.

The college receives the funds from UGC, SPPU etc. The college has developed a strategy to mobilize resources from all the available sources and use it for the further development of the college. Due to this strategy, though the college is establised in remote rural area but it has all the facilities for imparting quality education to the rural youth with focus on the girls. College has expanded the number of programs and has developed its infrastructural facilities along with IT facilities due to a strong strategy regarding financial mobilization. The funds obtained by college from different level is then utilized for educational and infrastructural development.

Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune provides

1. Grants to conduct seminars/ conferences/ workshops for the benefit of students and staff under quality Improvement programs and student development programs

- 2. Sports equipment grants help in getting equipment for open gym.
- 3. Grants are received for construction of building too.
- 4. Under the Earn and Learn Scheme, SPPU provides funds to the needy students.
- 5. College receives grants for conducting activities through out the year under National Service Scheme.
- 6. Examination grants are provided to teachers, students and administrative staff.

From Government :

1. Scholarship schemes like Bharat Sarkar Shishyvrutti, Kranti Jyoti savitribai Phule Scholarship etc are provided to the eligible and backward students.

2. Salary grant is received from government for both teaching and non teaching staff. The grant received is approximately 281.19 lacs in 2021-22.

From College internal resources:

1. Admission and other fees are collected from students of the college and other grants are received as shown in bracket (Bank Interest, Fines, Breakages, Common dues, a fee charged for issue of certificates).

These resources are utilized for college development and also to pay salary to the non grant staff of the college.

From Management:

1. Funds for infrastructural development like new building (Laboratories), windows, ready made and mobile toilets, a central stage for cultural activities etc.is provided by the management.

Financial audits

The college has a well developed system for internal and external audit. A statutory body named Kadam

and Company, Ahmednagar conducts internal audit every year. The audit is conducted every year in the month of March. The auditor and his team studies the statement of account, balance sheet and sends a certificate regarding the same. The certificate contains details regarding the funds received from governement in the form of salary grants to teaching and non teaching staff. The certificate gurantees that the college gives the entire salary to the teachers without any deduction in the form of grants or donations. The certificate also contains details like expenditure on account of DA, reading rooms etc. The company has the authority of sending compliances but due to clarity of accounts by the college, it hasnt received any compliances from the said company.

The strategies of IQAC

To acheive Vision and Mission, the College has established a functional IQAC/ IQAS.

The main functions of IQAC are

- IQAC was established in the College in 11/04/2014 for the quality enhancement and sustenance.
- IQAC has been trying to enrich its academic culture and enhance easy administration for the students.
- IQAC is consistently working on to magnify quality culture in its all spheres of College activities
- IQAC monitors the implementation of vision and mission of the College.

As an apex implementing body, IQAC prepares all the quality assurance strategies. Like development of quality culture, an effective feedback mechanism, implementation of new programs and certificate courses, a system of performance appraisal of both teaching and non teaching staff, holistic development of the students through planning of co-curricular and extra curricular activities through out the year, compliances of the recommendations of Peer Team Experts during cycle 1, organizing faculty development programs for both teaching and non teaching staff, planning of workshops, webinars etc. The IQAC promotes preparation of learning outcomes for the students with focus on program outcomes and course outcomes.

The IQAC has developed a system of audits llke

- Financial audit

- Green audit, energy audit and environment audit

The IQAC submits reports like AQAR to NAAC Office, students records to AISHE, Annual reports to SPPU.

The review mechanism

Review of Teaching Learning and evaluation Process:

As a reviewer, IQAC reviews:

- 1. The teaching learning methodologies used by the teachers and promotes use of blended teaching methods with apt use of experiential methods, practical learning and problem based methodologies
- 2. LCD Projector have been installed and connected with internet viz LAN/Wi-Fi. Use of these and other ICT teaching methodologies are reviewed by IQAC.
- 3.IQAC reviews the use of E-learning resources that are made available free for our college students and staff.
- 4.IQAC encouraged majority of teachers to register for Ph.D. and submit more and more research proposals and articles.
- 5. It monitors the system of mapping of program outcomes and course outcomes and prepares the report of the same. The system is the result of high percentage of acheivement of learning outcomes.
- 6. It reviews the feedback mechanism and prepares a action taken report.

Enhancement of Quality culture:

IQAC reviews a quality culture in the college by initiating various ways as follows.

College realizes its duty to promote gender sensitization around its location. Being located in rural area, attracting girls to college is a humongous task. Realising that and to attract more females to college, the college is providing all the possible infrastructural facilities in the college premises. Safety and security of the girls is given utmost priority. Besides, college has been conducting variety of activities to instill confidence among the girls.

Physical facilities

1. Separate Girls common room is provided to the girl students. This room provides all the basic facilities like mirror, place to rest etc.

2. Separate Washroom and toilet facilities are provided to both boys and girl students.

3. College realizes the importance of hygiene among girls and is trying to contact non government agencies for installation of vending machines to get disposable napkins for the girls.

4. Seperate parking facilities for girls.

5. Special physical protection to girls through well mounded compund and CCTV survellience hroughout the college campus is made available.

Promotion of gender equity through activities

1.College conducts health checkup for girls where in medical practitioners are invited for checkup.

2. On the occasion of International Women's Day, experts are invited for counselling of girls regarding their health and hygiene especially during menstrual cycles.

3. The college has a Anti sexual harrassment cell where in activities are conducted to bring awareness among girls.

4. The college frequently organizes HB Checkup Camps for Girls, which can help to find anemic girls.

5. Taekwondo training and self-defence workshops for girls to spread awareness about safety and security

6. Various girl-centric activities, such as Skip rope Competition, Rangoli Competitions

7. Yoga and meditation programs for girls are carried out.

8. NSS, and Earn and Learn are the programs for students where female students have an equal opportunity to participate.

9. Sports activities are carried out where girls get equal opportunities in sports like Taekwondo, Fit India Competition, kabaddi, Skip rope competition etc.

10. A health check-up is conducted on a compulsory basis for every first-year admission student for UG courses.

11. Awareness and counselling of the students is conducted on various social issues by conducting mass counselling sessions, especially for girls, on topics like sexual harassment, law and order, etc.

12. Students especially girls are motivated to participate in various debate competitions, essay writing competitions.

13. During NSS Camps, sessions on Save Girl Child rally, HIV awareness, Social Media Awareness, and Adolescent Awareness are held.

The college motivates all the students especially girls to participate in all the curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. The college has carried out several initiatives to address gender equity and sensitization for students during the last five years.

Outcome

The number of girls entrants in the college has been increasing every year. In 2017-18 the number of girls was 106 and that increased to 167 in 2021-22.

Another achievement of the college is entrant of girls from all the categories like SC, ST etc in college.

1. Title: Fort Conservation and Preservation

Objectives of the Best Practices

The objectives of fort conservation and preservation as best practice can vary depending on the specific fort and its historical, cultural, and social significance

- Protecting the fort's historical and cultural significance.
- Maintaining the fort's physical integrity of fort.
- Enhancing public understanding and appreciation.
- Creating awareness among students regarding forts and their conservation

Context :

Modernization and urbanization is bringing a very fast change in landscape of the country. Under these changing conditions, the college realizes need to protect and conserve the existing resources. Maharshtra is

well known for its forts and the Maratha struggle for protection of forts from foreign aggression. Keeping in line with these historical aspects, college started developing an awareness regarding forts and involved students into it by organizing activities related to fort protection and conservation.

The Practice :

The conservation and preservation of forts is an important aspect of cultural heritage preservation, and colleges can play an important role in promoting best practices in this area. Our college establish regular year schedules for cleaning, Tree Plantation, and maintenance of fort. As a college initiative of conservation and preservation of forts college decide to select "**Bahadurgad**".

This fort has great importance in the Maratha Empire but government and resident people were unable to conserve and maintain it properly. As Chhatrapati Sambhaji Maharaj was a divine power for all the people. History say that he was prisoned at this fort. Taking this as initiative from the Shrigonda taluka, it was aim of our only college to create awareness of fort in the people and conserve it. As it was college initiative students were also made aware of the fort conservation. So the Campaign has started from 2017-18.

During the year 2017-18, Department of NSS scheduled the Fort conservation campaign at Bahadurgad fort situated in Shrigonda taluka. About 29 students participated in campaign. The Cleanliness program was conducted and after that nearly about 200 trees were planted in the surroundings of fort and the campaign was completed.

During the year 2018-19 the NSS department arrange the campaign at the same fort Bahadurgad and the last year planted trees were analyzed. About 61 students were present at the fort for the campaign. At this time nearly 200 trees were again planted in the region of fort.

In the year 2019-20 the NSS department arrange the program at lastly attended fort. The previous planted trees were given the water and analysed the growth of trees. Our college played an important role in promoting education about fort conservation and preservation.

In the last two years, as an after effect of covid pandemic, the college couldnt participate in the program

In summary, the Taekwondo camp is a comprehensive training program that provides college students with an immensive experience in Taekwondo. Led by Physical Director, the camp offers a rigorous and challenging training program that focuses on developing physical fitness, mental strength, and Taekwondo skills. In addition to training, the camp also provides the certificates issued to every student who participated.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

The college is making its mark due to its scholarship scheme and participation and impact of institute on the village due to its activities.

Kukadi Education Society's Savitribai College of Arts, Pimpalgaon Pisa is located in a rural area. The village has a total population of 8941 and is geographically distant from the city. The founders realize these constraints and established the educational institute with the motto of helping the villagers. The students come from poor financial condition. To motivate these students to complete their education, the college provides scholarship schemes both through the Government and through the institution.

The college has Scholarship Department for the students that help them to fill up the Scholarship forms easily through the portal. All the required information is given in detail to the students. Care is taken to ensure that the students admitted in the college are not deprived of the benefits of the scheme. 14 types of scholarships from central government, state government and affiliating university is provided to the students. This scholarship program is designed to provide financial assistance to students who demonstrate academic excellence and financial need. 180 students have benefitted from these scholarships.

Though this program is highly competitive, but it benefits only a selected number of students due to stringent conditions of the schemes. However, for those who do fit in any of these scholarships,but are needy and willing to be in the educational stream are helped by the college through institutional scholarship. Recipients receive a substantial amount of financial aid, allowing them to focus on their studies without the worry of financial constraints. This support also provides students with the opportunity to participate in extracurricular activities and other opportunities that they might not have been able to afford otherwise. In last five year 1113 students out of 1835 students (more than 60 percent) have benefitted from the scheme.

In addition to the scholarship program, the institution has also implemented an earn and learn scheme. This scheme helps the students to earn some salary while studying. They are accomodated in the college work. This helps them financially and prepares them professionally for their future life. The program has helped to bridge the gap between academic studies and real-world experience, preparing students for success in their chosen fields. Overall, the performance of the institution in implementing its scholarship and earn and learn schemes has been outstanding. These programs have helped to support students in achieving their academic and career goals, while also attracting top talent to the institution. The institution's commitment to providing high-quality education and opportunities for its students has been demonstrated through these initiatives, and the success of its students is a testament to the effectiveness of these programs. Some of the

data has been provided below of scholarship and Earn & learn scheme.

Total amount received from scholarship during each academic year:-

One more distinct feature of the college is that it is working for the benefit of the residentials in and around the college complex.

The college ensures participation of students, staff and society in the Blood donation Camp organized twice a year. These camps are organized in collaboration with external agencies like "**New Arpan Voluntory Blood centre**". The event was a great success and received an overwhelming response from the students and faculty members. The blood donation camp was set up in the college which was well-decorated with posters and banners promoting the importance of blood donation. Medical personnel from the blood bank were present to conduct the camp and provide necessary assistance. Its was conducted twice in the year 2021-22. In the first Blood donation camp nearly about 51 bags of blood was donated and in second camp 53 bags of blood was donated . Overall it was a huge success and helped in creating awareness about the importance of blood donation among the students faculty members and villagers.

During pandemic, college had setup a COVID Care Centre in the college premises to provide medical care and support to COVID-19 patients. The centre was operational from 21st April 2021 to 14th June 2021.

It was set up in compliance with all the safety guidelines and protocols issued by the government and healthcare authorities. The centre was equipped with necessary medical equipment like a medical team consisting of doctors, nurses, and other healthcare workers to provide round-the-clock medical care to the patients. The centre was designed to accommodate a maximum of 150 bed and 25 oxygen bed for patients . The patients were provided with individual beds. The centre also had a separate section for the isolation of COVID-19 positive patients to prevent the spread of the virus. The patients were provided with nutritious meals, medicines, and other necessary medical supplies. The medical team provided regular health check-ups and medical consultations to monitor the patients' health and provide timely medical interventions. The centre also had a dedicated team of sanitation workers who ensured the cleanliness and hygiene of the premises. The entire centre was regularly sanitized to prevent the spread of the virus. The

COVID Care Centre received a great response from the local community and provided much-needed medical care and support to the patients during the pandemic. The centre successfully treated 294 patients during its operational period. In this Covid Care centre nearly about 13 Teaching and Non- Teaching staff were involved in the centre.

All the college staff contributed financially in the covid centre. An amount of approximately RS 1.95 Lacs was donated to the centre and was used for distribution of mask and sanitizer in the village. The alumni of the college was motivated to contribute by donation of medicines to centre.

Thus, college through its activities is contributing in village development.

The college alumni has participated in these programs as participant, Kirtankars etc. These efforts help in developing a bond and filling the gap between villagers and faculty.

The village organizes religeous functions related to *Dutt Jayanti* etc. During all these functions and celebrations, teachers voluntarily contribute finance and are active participants.

During Covid Pandemic college Principal and staff has contributed money to distribute masks, sanitizer etc.

There is an open jail in nearby vicinity where in the prisoners reside. College has actively participated in the programs like rehabiliation of these prisoners, distribution of sweets etc.

One of the programs in village is *Dindi* where in the main participants are the poor villager. College provides food and water to them.

Every year an Army camp from Ahmadnagar District visits the village for training and stays for 10 days in village. College provides basic facilities like water, college ground and contribute in making the stay comfortable.

Concluding Remarks :

The college is functioniong in village from last 24 years without being deterred by the challenges that are present naturally in a rural area. The progress of the college is vigilant in the number of students (especially) girls enrolled in college, number of students taking admission from diverse background, number of programs offered by the college, diversity in the program, contribution in societal development, passing percentage of students, in the activities conducted etc. The college is contributing its bit by developing a network between college, students, alumni, villagers and industrialists by the curricular, co-curricular and extra curricular activities organized throughout the year. The natural and human disturbances like covid could not demotivate the staff in working. The college continued to contribute in the overall development of itself and society.

While continuing with the regular teaching and learning, development and enhancement of quality culture has been an important concern. Accordingly, the IQAC of the college has complied with all the compliances given by the Peer Team Members in cycle 1 and they are stated as under:

Action Taken Report on Recommendations

1. Three new programs B.Sc., B.Com., M.A. (Economics) and 6 certificate courses on varied topics like Soft Skill Development Program, Modi Script Writing and Reading etc were started in the assessment period.

2. Library books and Equipment purchased were of approximately Rs10.29 lacs

3. One national webinar and State level seminars have been organized by the departments.

4. College has signed 11 MoUs with organization and institutes for benefit of the students.

5. College has received three Minor Research Project grants from UGC

6. Sports department has been activated by sports grants and equipment. An open Gym, a huge playground is the special feature of the college.

7. College has used Open Educational Resource (OER) for enhancing library as knowledge learning resource.

Some of the compliances like a bus for travelling and hostel facilities could not be accomplished due to lack of funds and the disturbance caused by the Corona Pandemic.

The college with its entire efforts in last few years, now is presenting itself for the second cycle reaccreditation.
